Tips for Organizing Info

1. By Place

<u>At the White House</u>, blah-blah (everything from the White House)

In the 2^{nd} District, yada-yada (everything about the 2^{nd} District)

At the meeting, blah-blah (everything from the meeting)

2. <u>By Topic/Theme</u>

On education, the mayor proposed... (everything about education)

<u>Of the mayor's educational proposals</u>, Councilman Jones expressed outrage (everything about his outrage)

<u>On economic development</u>, the president urged...(everything about econ development)

If you've done a good nut graf(s) or BJ intro, you have already briefly summarized your TOPICS/THEMES there. As you develop them in the rest of the story, use the introductory phrase – <u>on education</u> – to cue the audience to what's coming next.

3. By Source

- Follow the Poor-Player Theory
- Introduce the source before quoting or paraphrasing give credentials, authority, expertise.
- Keep info from a source all in one place (if possible and it usually is)
- Don't let a source pop in and out of the story, like the Cheshire Cat (that's confusing)
- If you must bring a source back into the story, BRIEFLY re-identify the source (Fire Chief Jones / Smith, the head of the literacy advocates' group)

NOTE: These phrases also often work as <u>TRANSITIONS</u> that help your audience move from place to place, from topic to topic, from source to source. Put them at the <u>BEGINNING</u> of the sentence to work as transitions and to prepare your audience for what's coming next.
